From the Editor

October 2012 marked the 50th anniversary of the Cuban Missile Crisis, one of the most memorable events of the Cold War era. In contrast, few of the current residents of Paoli and Valley Forge are aware that the Cold War brought a mis-

sile base to our own back yards. In this issue, Roger Thorne relates the tale of how the pastoral environs of the Great Valley and the sparsely populated ridge of Valley Forge Mountain were transformed by the presence of a Nike missile installation manned by Army personnel during the 1950s-1960s.

Roger has done an outstanding job of locating

and interviewing local residents with memories of the site and its staff, as well as some of the staff members themselves. Interestingly, he discovered that some of the former base personnel never left the area, after marrying into local families. One former soldier was able to

attend Roger's presentation on the Nike site, on which this article is based, at the Historical Society's November meeting. That presentation resulted in so much additional feedback on the Nike base that Roger spent several more weeks



following up on leads and incorporating them into his article. Thanks to his thoroughness, the readers of this issue will enjoy even more details on the subject than were presented in November.

Roger has announced his intent to step down as Chair of the Historical Society, in order to devote more time to research and writing. While we will miss his leader-

ship, there is no question that all those who appreciate local history will benefit from his future insights into whichever topics he chooses to explore. Many thanks to Roger for his years at the helm of the Society, and for another excellent article.




